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## Welcome to BIEN 2024!

We are thrilled to be hosting you in the beautiful, World Heritage city of Bath. Over the next three days we will be diving into the latest and best of research, policy, advocacy, and organising around basic income, with speakers from all corners of the globe. Our programme is full of new voices, as well as established authorities, and our sessions weave together groups from all backgrounds and career stages.

We have six parallel streams running across three full days of Congress, along with an entire, parallel UK day taking place simultaneously on Day 3 of Congress and open both to BIEN Congress attendees and UK civil society. We also have a thorough programme of relaxing and fun extra-curricular activities, including a walk along the Bath Skyline overlooking the city in the afternoon of Day 1, Welcome Drinks on Campus in the evening of Day 1, a Walking Tour of the city on Day 2, plus the Congress Dinner that same evening.

This year's Congress is taking place at the University of Bath, located just 20 minutes from the city centre. Over recent years, Bath has become an international hub of work on basic income, playing host to the global [UBI Piloters Network](#), convened with BIEN, to the [Institute for Policy Research's UBI Lab](#), to the team behind India's latest, groundbreaking [UBI+ pilot](#) in Hyderabad, and to the [Bath UBI Beacon](#), which is working to establish the UK's first Institute for Basic Income Studies and is the official host of this year's Congress.

At the UBI Beacon, we work across multiple themes including UBI Piloting, UBI and Public Health, UBI and Climate Change, and UBI, Technological Change and the Future of Work. We are excited to welcome you here for the Congress, and we're keen to welcome future colleagues, students, and comrades who wish to apply to visit or work with us! # Co-creating Unconditionality at BIEN 2024: Shared Principles for All

## *Introductory Note*

Perhaps the most radical aspect of basic income is its unconditionality; you don't have to be or do anything to get it. Unconditionality is so alien to our experience, to how our societies currently work, that it's no surprise that people find it a hard concept to accept, let alone embrace. But what if we could bring this ethos, this spirit of unconditionality into our culture; into how we all relate at Congress? What would that look and feel like?

This is an invitation to everyone coming to BIEN to give it a go and find out. Concretely, it's an invitation for everyone – whether panellist, Chair, audience participant, or room host – to bring our awareness to the usual practices and relations of power and conditionality that we often instinctively reproduce and, by doing so, to transform them. For those of us accustomed to speaking first and being heard, it might be to make unconditional space for those least heard. For those of us who feel silenced by (often unspoken) conditions, it might be to speak up, knowing that our voice, our presence, is welcomed and needed here.

The experience of unconditionality flourishes in spaces of safety and connection. With this in mind, we have co-produced the following list of principles and requests that we urge all to adhere to at BIEN 2024.

## *Shared Principles for All*

- Please think before you speak: ask yourself, 'Is what I have to say really going to add to the space?'
- If you are someone who often speaks and is comfortable doing so, please challenge yourself by consciously stepping back, waiting for others to speak before you step forward.
- If you are someone who is less comfortable speaking and who does not speak as often as others, consider challenging yourself to speak earlier.

- Always offer feedback that is constructive. Share what you enjoyed about what you heard. If there are pieces you enjoyed less, check that the presenter is open to hearing what they are. If they say yes, be clear, compassionate, and specific in sharing what might have improved things for you and how.
- Practice remembering that we all come from different life experiences, all will have different perspectives, and all will have something useful to contribute.
- Lived experience and academic knowledge are both valuable!
- Be humble and own that you might not know or have the answer – most of us are only ever searching for it!
- Let's not talk over each other or with aggression (passion is great!). We are here to build relationships and deepen connections; let's treat each other as friends and allies above all.
- Be kind. Be careful. Be considerate. Be collegial.

## Guidelines for Sessions

All Congress rooms and all sessions within those rooms will have a dedicated Room Host, who will be a member of the Local Organising Committee or the team of volunteers. These hosts will have lead responsibility for the rooms. In collaboration with session Chairs, they will help to ensure that sessions are conducted appropriately and are prepared in advance. We are asking all hosts, Chairs and panellists to arrive at their session at least 20 minutes prior to its start, in order to go through guidelines and make necessary preparations. Room Hosts and Chairs will be in charge of managing Zoom and online participation.

### *Requests for Chairs*

- Many of our panels come with Chairs or, if they are large, may have had a Chair allocated to them. If your panel does not have a Chair, please appoint someone to act as Chair for you.
- Chairs, please liaise with the Room Host in advance of your session and be clear with panellists before the start of each session what will be expected of them, especially in terms of timings.
- Please ensure that panellists respect timings.
- Please ensure ample time for questions from the audience.
- Please remind yourselves and the audience of the shared principles above in advance of the session.
- Please interrupt extended or repeated audience contributions if you sense these are detracting from the spirit of the event or are limiting others' chances to contribute or respond.
- Along with the Room Host, Please check to make sure that the Zoom room is open and ensure that those on Zoom are muted unless they are asking a question or presenting.
- Please be sure to press record on the room's Zoom at the start of the presentations and to stop recording at their end.

### *Requests for Presenters*

- Please arrive at least 20 minutes early for your session in order to meet the Room Host, the Chair, and your co-panellists, and to prepare slides or other visuals.
- Please bring your presentations on a USB key to upload before the start of the session.

- Please establish in advance with your Chair and co-panellists what the running order is and what the timings are.
- Please respect those timings!
- Please be as clear and concise as you can; avoid jargon and speak as much as possible in layperson's terms.

### ***Requests for Audience Participants***

- Please consult and follow the Shared Principles above.
- Please respect all panellists and follow the guidelines laid out by your session's Room Host and Chair.

## A Note on Hybrid Sessions and Video Recording

Please note that all sessions will have virtual presenting/attending capacity, since each room will be allocated a Zoom room that will remain open for each day of the Congress. All Zoom rooms and the people responsible for them are listed in the Conference Programme (p.18) below.

In addition, please note that we intend to video record all presentations, in order to develop a bank of visual assets for the basic income community and movement. If you do not wish to have your presentation recorded, please tell the Chair of your session and your co-presenters in advance. Otherwise, consent to record presentations will be assumed. All presentations will be recorded automatically via the Zoom link allocated to the room and downloaded via the University's Panopto software. These will then be stored by BIEN and will be made available for anyone who wishes to use them in the basic income community and movement.

Finally, we will have a team present from openDemocracy who will be conducting video interviews with Congress participants. openDemocracy has millions of readers every year and is at the forefront of attempts in Europe to build an alternative to corporate media. They frequently cover basic income debates and have published a number of important series' around UBI over recent years (see here for two examples: <https://www.opendemocracy.net/en/beyond-trafficking-and-slavery/universal-basic-income-way-through-storm/> and <https://www.opendemocracy.net/en/beyond-trafficking-and-slavery/radical-combination-degrowth-and-basic-income/>). The idea behind their presence at Congress is to raise the profile of UBI in the media and to produce a bank of visual assets that will be available to the wider movement – everything is published under a Creative Commons license and so will be usable by all. Please do give them 10 minutes of your time if you are asked for an interview!

## Film Screenings

We have a number of new films being screened at this year's Congress! For anyone interested in hope, possibility, and the radical power of struggles for social change, these movies are for you!

### **Unconditional (Day 1, CB1.12)**

What would it mean to help the poor without preconditions? To address the precarity at the heart of poverty? And to stand in solidarity with, rather than offering unwelcome charity to, those who are marginalised and forgotten?

'Unconditional' tells the story of two inspiring policy experiments in India and Bangladesh, which turned traditional social policymaking on its head. Combining universal basic income with open-ended community organiser support across five urban slums in Dhaka and Hyderabad, these experiments showed what can be possible when social assistance is rooted in principles of care, connection, and justice.

Told through the stories of pilot participants, with contributions from their community organisers, this 30-minute documentary sheds light on the power of 'UBI plus' and points towards a future where unconditionality is the foundation stone of social policy.

The filmmakers will be in attendance and will present the film, after which they are keen to receive critical commentary and feedback from the audience, particularly around how the film can be useful for basic income advocacy and how it can be strengthened. The legendary local filmmaker and multi Palme D'Or winner, Ken Loach, has been invited as a discussant.

### **A Decent Path (Day 2, CB3.5)**

The 'Social Relief of Distress Grant' was introduced in South Africa during the Covid-19 Pandemic at an amount of R350 per month. This monthly income support brought immediate relief to millions of unemployed adults and kept many local economies afloat, greatly reducing the economic disaster that could have followed the devastating impact of the pandemic and the lockdowns that followed.

‘A Decent Path’ is a gripping documentary that charts the impact of the R350 grant on the lives of four main beneficiaries. Interspersed with conversations with policy experts including the Minister of Social Development Minister Zulu, the film shows how transformative this grant can be, and how devastating the loss of the grant is for beneficiaries. The film was produced as part of the nationwide South African civil society push to have the country to be the first anywhere to adopt a UBI.

### **Outgrow the System (Day 3, CB3.5)**

The original meaning of the word ‘economy’ is ‘household management’. The economy of today however, is not householding, but rather consuming our finite natural resources at an alarming pace. ‘Outgrow the System’ explores how we can return to the essence of the term and design an economic system that genuinely manages our scarce resources.

Beyond the narrow mainstream debate and the teachings of business schools, numerous new economic ideas and practices are emerging. They challenge old assumptions and offer fresh perspectives on how we can reorganize our production and consumption, in order to ensure our survival as a species on this planet.

‘Outgrow the System’ aims to bring these transformative ideas to the forefront. It celebrates the abundance of creativity and ideas that exist worldwide, urging them to collide and converge. The film envisions a world where social movements worldwide can rally behind positive visions instead of merely opposing dystopias.

## Art and Creative Sessions

BIEN 2024 features a number of creative contributions that differ from more typical academic presentations. Award-winning artist and researcher, Katrin Hattenhauer, will run a double session on 'Basic Income and Social Sculpture'. Social sculpture is a theory developed by the artist Joseph Beuys in the 1970s based on the concept that everything is art, that every aspect of life could be approached creatively and, as a result, everyone has the potential to be an artist. 'Co-Creating A Visualised Understanding Of The Dynamic Links Between A Universal Basic Income And Sustainable Diets In The UK' is a participatory, multi-method workshop led by UBI Lab Food. Participants will work with each other and a facilitator to develop shared understanding and a shared visual that documents the links between UBI and sustainable food production and consumption.

'Co-creating a UBI Implementation Roadmap for India: A Template for Global Adaptation' will also be a participatory, interactive discussion, featuring context-setting, panel discussion and breakout work to enable deep dives into specific areas of UBI implementation.

LEGO® SERIOUS PLAY® will be used to co-develop proposals for UBI policies and pilots, while various UBI-themed games are available in the Foyer.

## Getting to Bath

### By car

Travelling to the Bath is easy as it is situated just off the M4 and not far from Bristol. However, Bath is a small, and widely visited city which means it has not escaped the curse of modern city traffic. Do allow additional time if travelling during peak periods.

The university campus does have parking (see [here](#)) however this is limited. The city has many other parking options, which are just a short bus journey from the campus.

### By train

The nearest railway station to the university is Bath Spa. Trains run directly from London Paddington and take approximate 75-90mins. Book tickets on the [Trainline](#), [National Rail](#), or [Great Western Railway](#) websites. From the railway station, you can easily get a taxi, bus, or walk to the University (see below).

### By coach

National Express coaches run directly from London Victoria to Bath Bus station. For more information, please see the National Express [website](#).

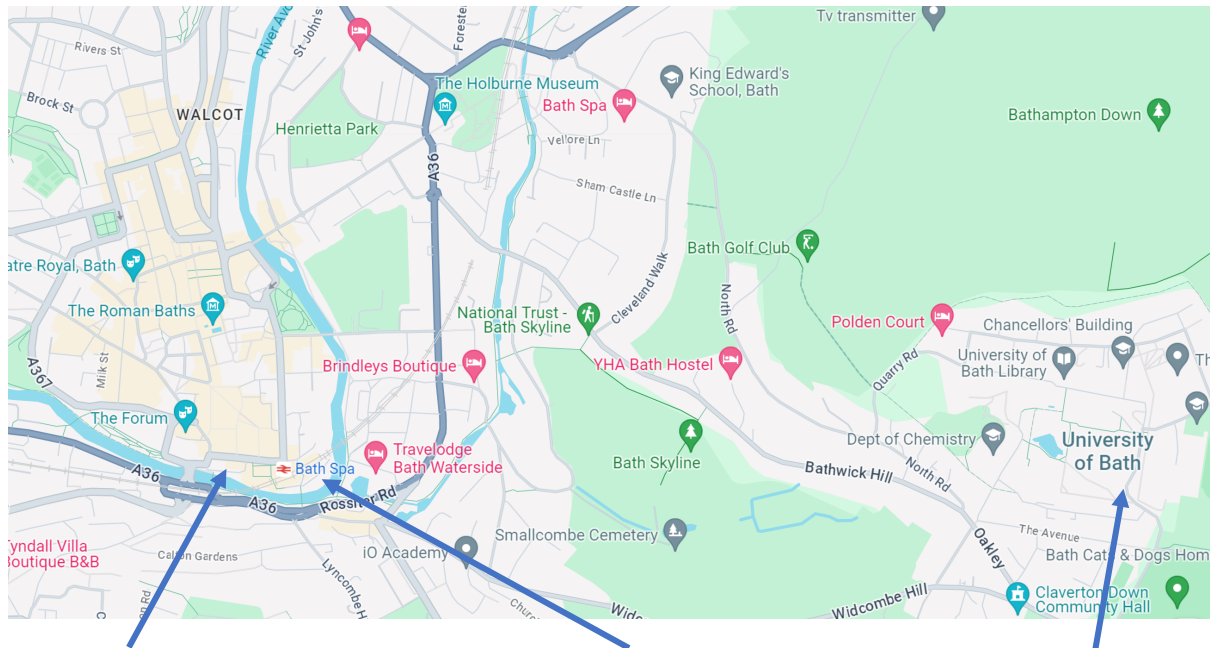
### By plane

Bristol Airport is the closest airport to Bath. From there you can get the [AirDecker](#) bus directly to Bath Railway station. Alternatively, you can get the [Airport Flyer](#) bus to Bristol Temple Meads railway station, and then take the train to Bath Spa.

### By bus

The U1 and U2 bus services go from the city centre directly to the university. There is a stop for the U1 service from opposite Bath Bus station, which is located next to the railway train station. The journey from here is approximately 15-20 mins. Arrivals Square, the final stop on the route, is located right outside the Chancellors Building. ### By taxi

Taxis are available from outside the railway station. The journey is about 10 mins and costs approximately £10-15.

### E-scooter / Bike

## Walking

The University is located at the top of Bathwick Hill, which takes approximately 20-30 minutes to climb from St. Mary's Church at the bottom. Walking offers the opportunity to cross Bathwick Meadows, with spectacular views of the city.

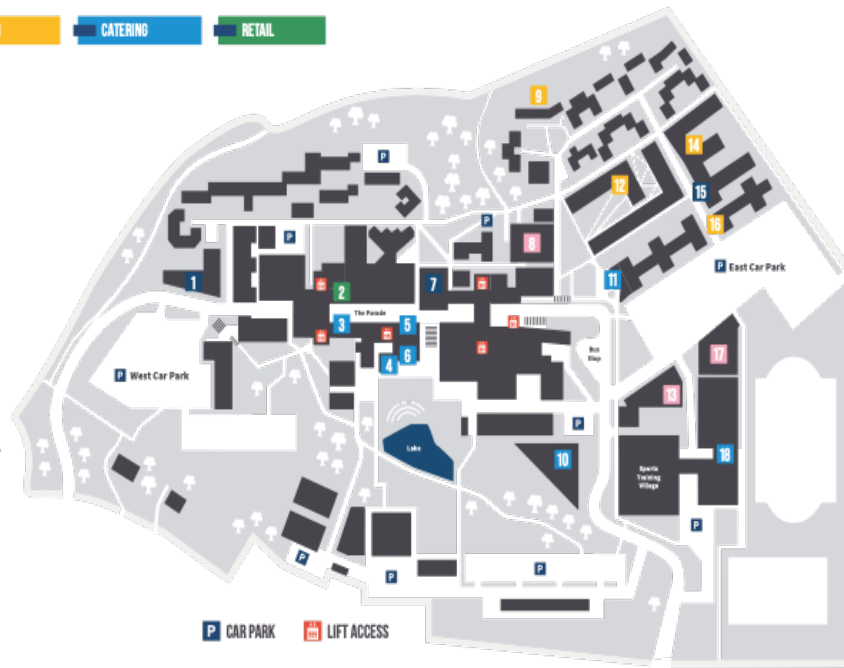

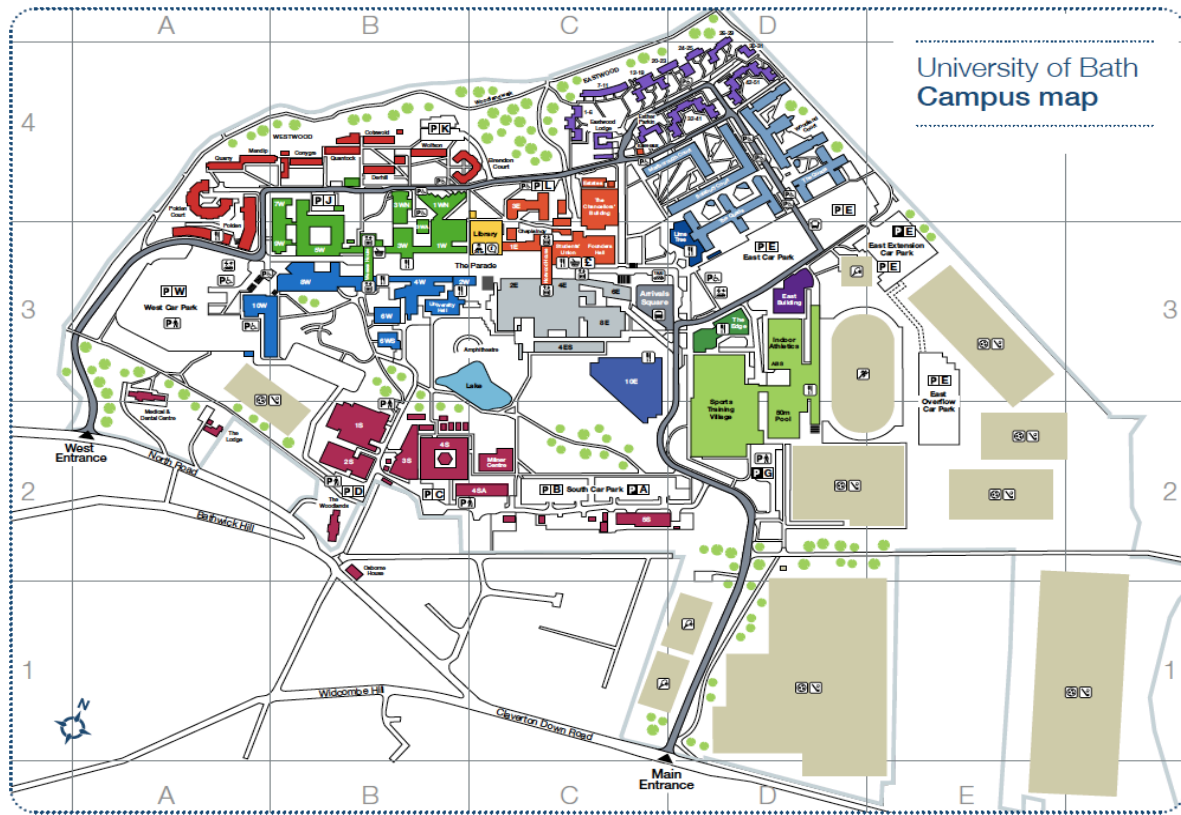

The Campus is built around the main Parade which forms a central spine with Norwood House at the east end and Wessex House at the west end. The Library and Learning Centre is the University's central hub and all buildings are identified according to their east/west position in relation to it. Odd numbers in building names indicate that they are located on the northern side of the Parade, on the same side as the Library, and even numbers are on the southern side. The main pedestrian Parade is Level 2.

Neil Howard	Neil is an anthropologist of development turned social protection scholar. His work ethnographically examines the governance of exploitative, ‘indecent’ and ‘unfree’ labour and in particular the various forms of it targeted for eradication by the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). It further looks at innovative forms of labour and social protection – most notably UBI combined with participatory forms of community organising – and explores the intersection of these interventions with various public policy challenges. Neil recently co-leads two large international policy experiments looking at this combination, in Dhaka, Bangladesh, and Hyderabad, India: see <a href="https://clarissa.global/">https://clarissa.global/</a> and <a href="https://www.work-free.net/">https://www.work-free.net/</a> . He leads the Bath UBI Beacon and sits on the BIEN Executive Committee.
